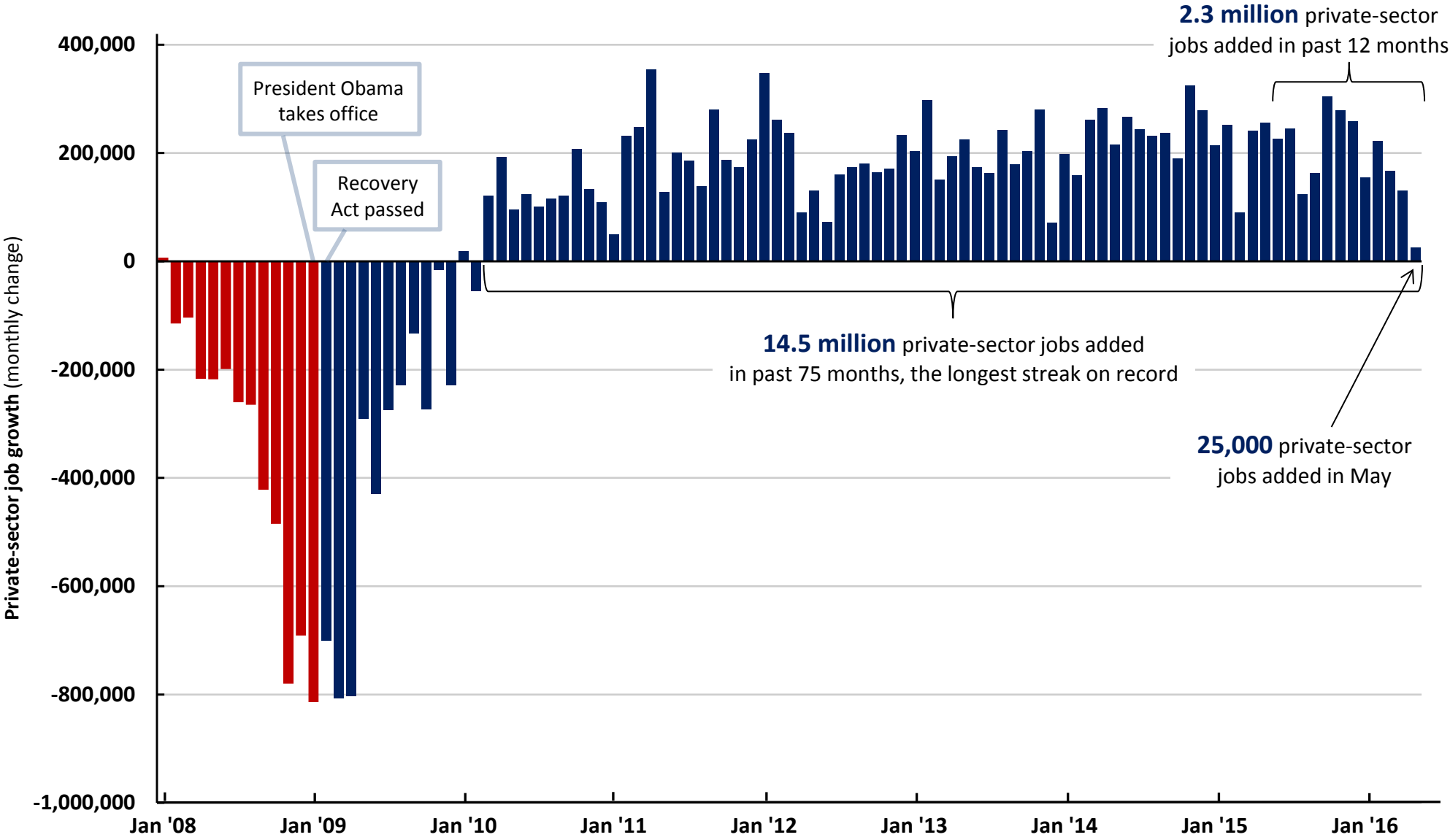


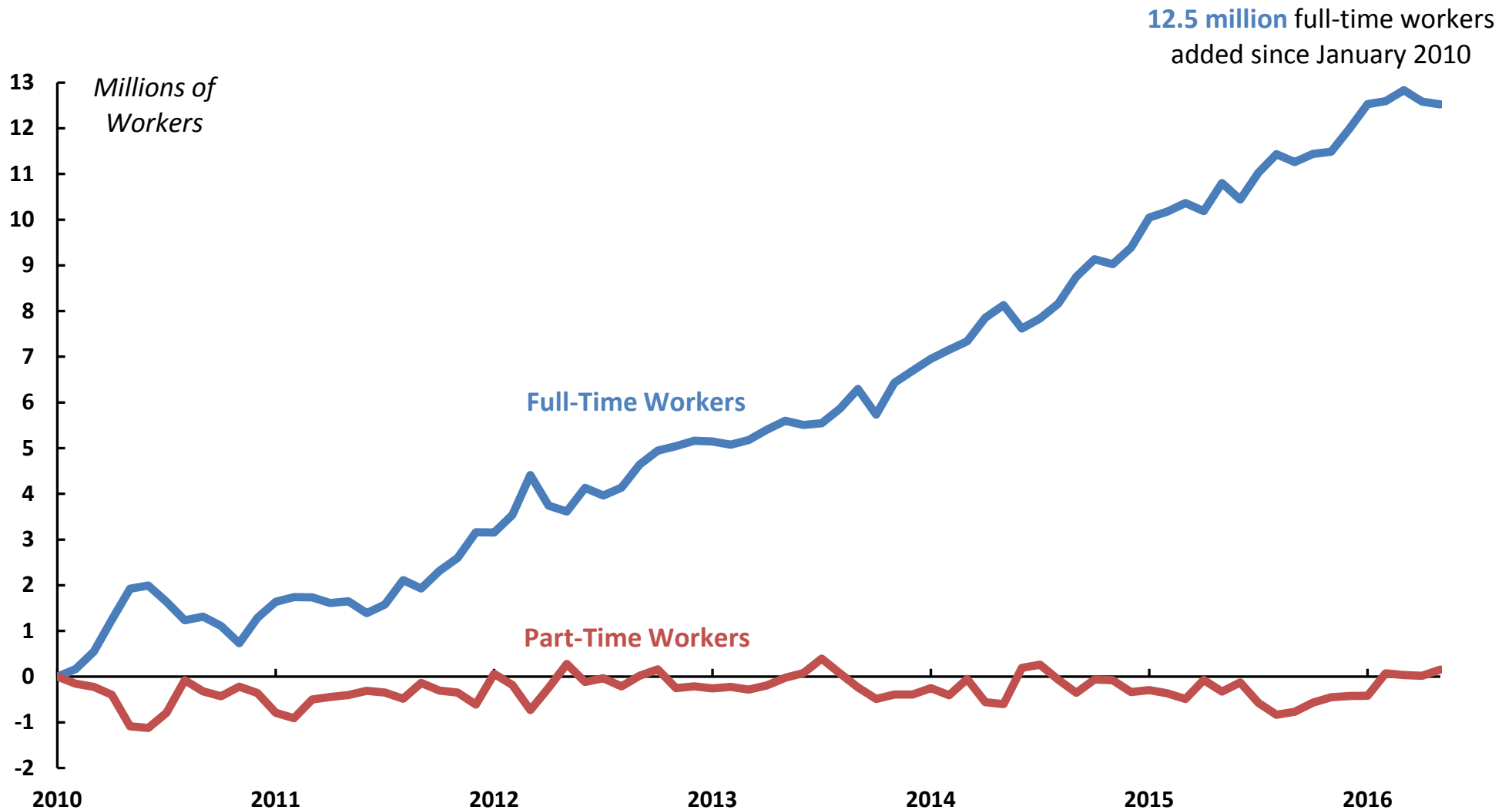
Private-Sector Job Growth Continues in May

All Employment Growth Has Been Full-Time Jobs

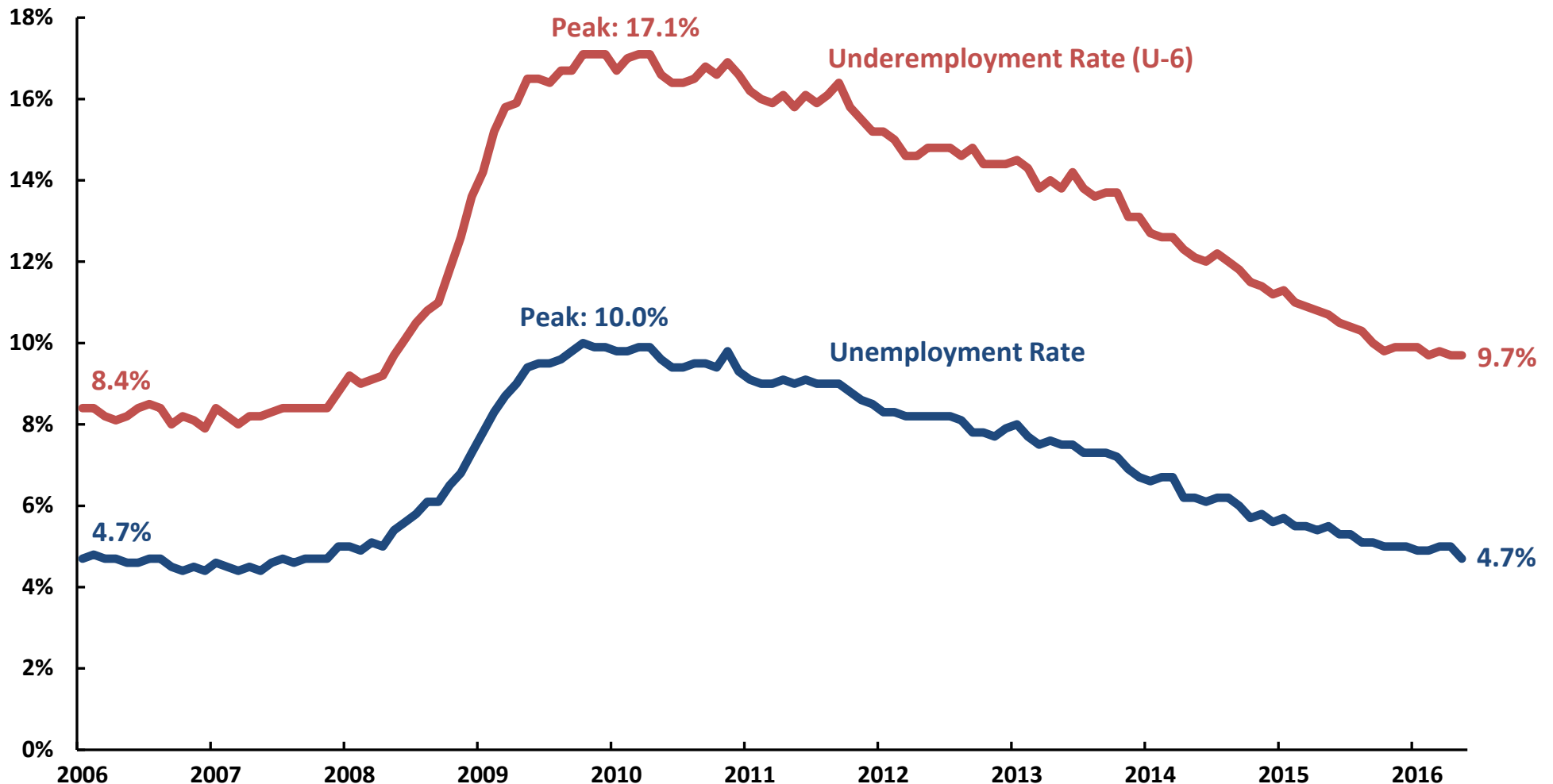

January 2006 to May 2016

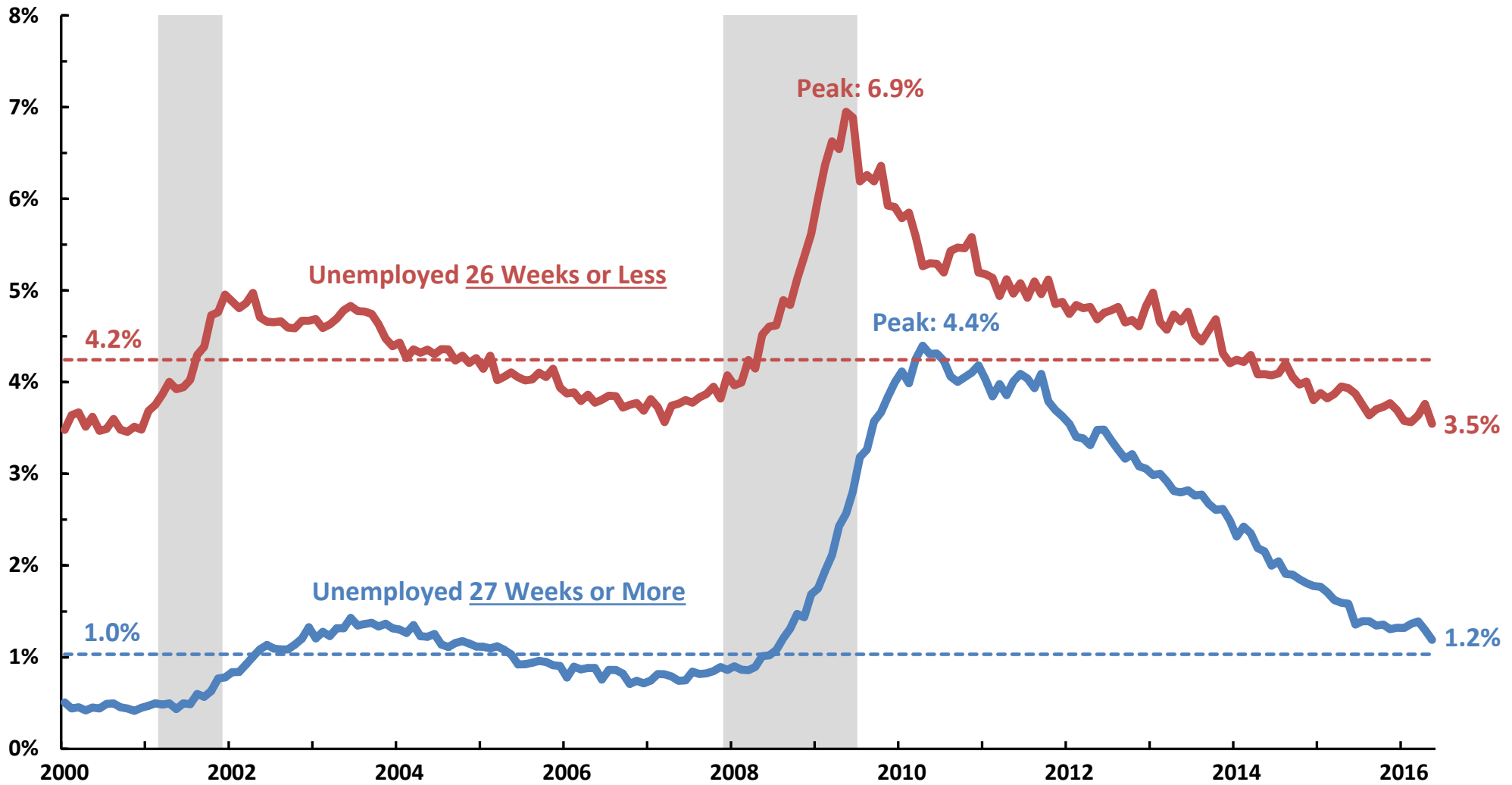

Declines in Short- and Long-Term Unemployment

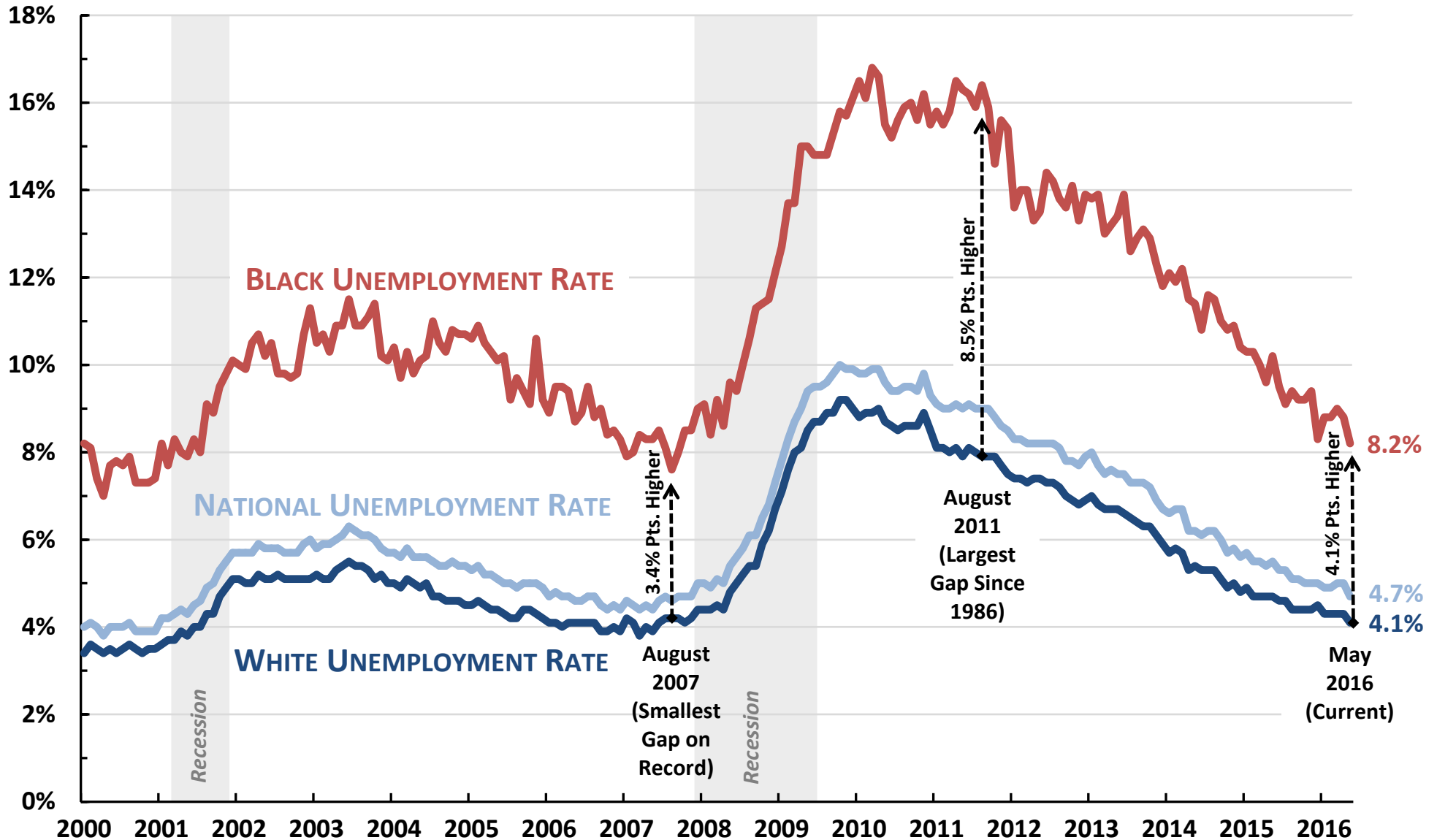
Percent of the labor force unemployed by duration, January 2000 to May 2016

Black vs. White Unemployment

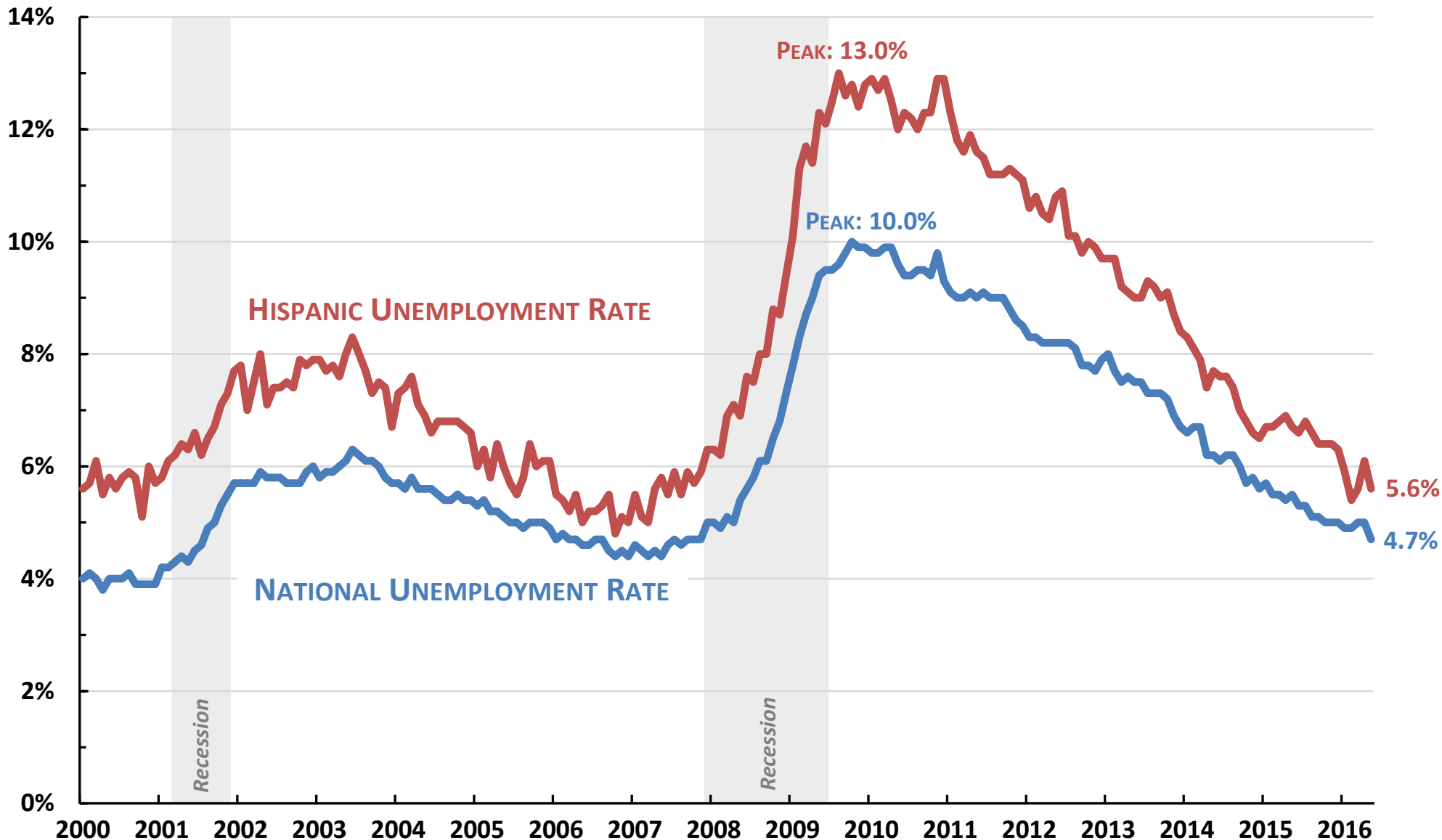

January 2000 to May 2016

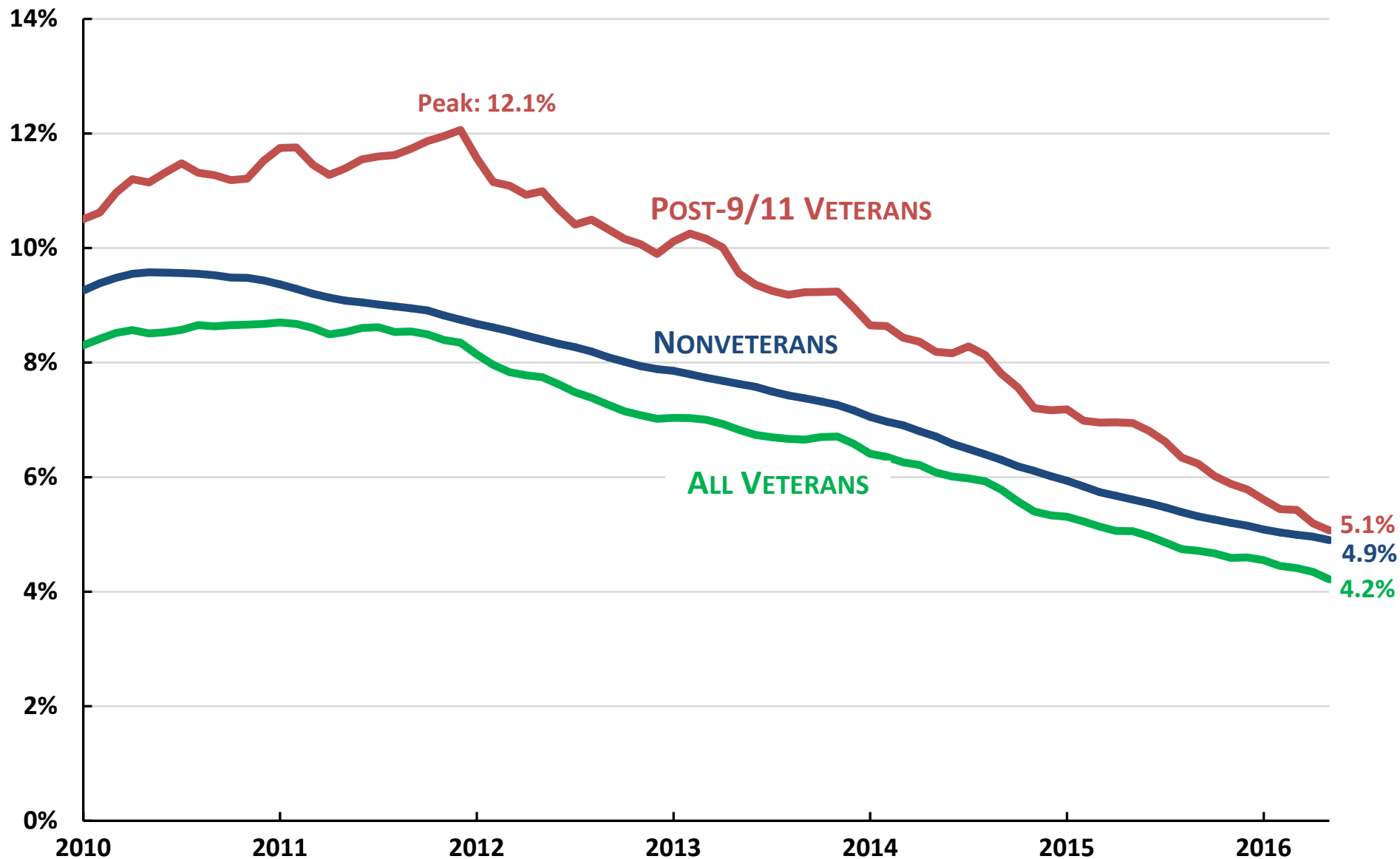

12-month moving averages, January 2010 to May 2016



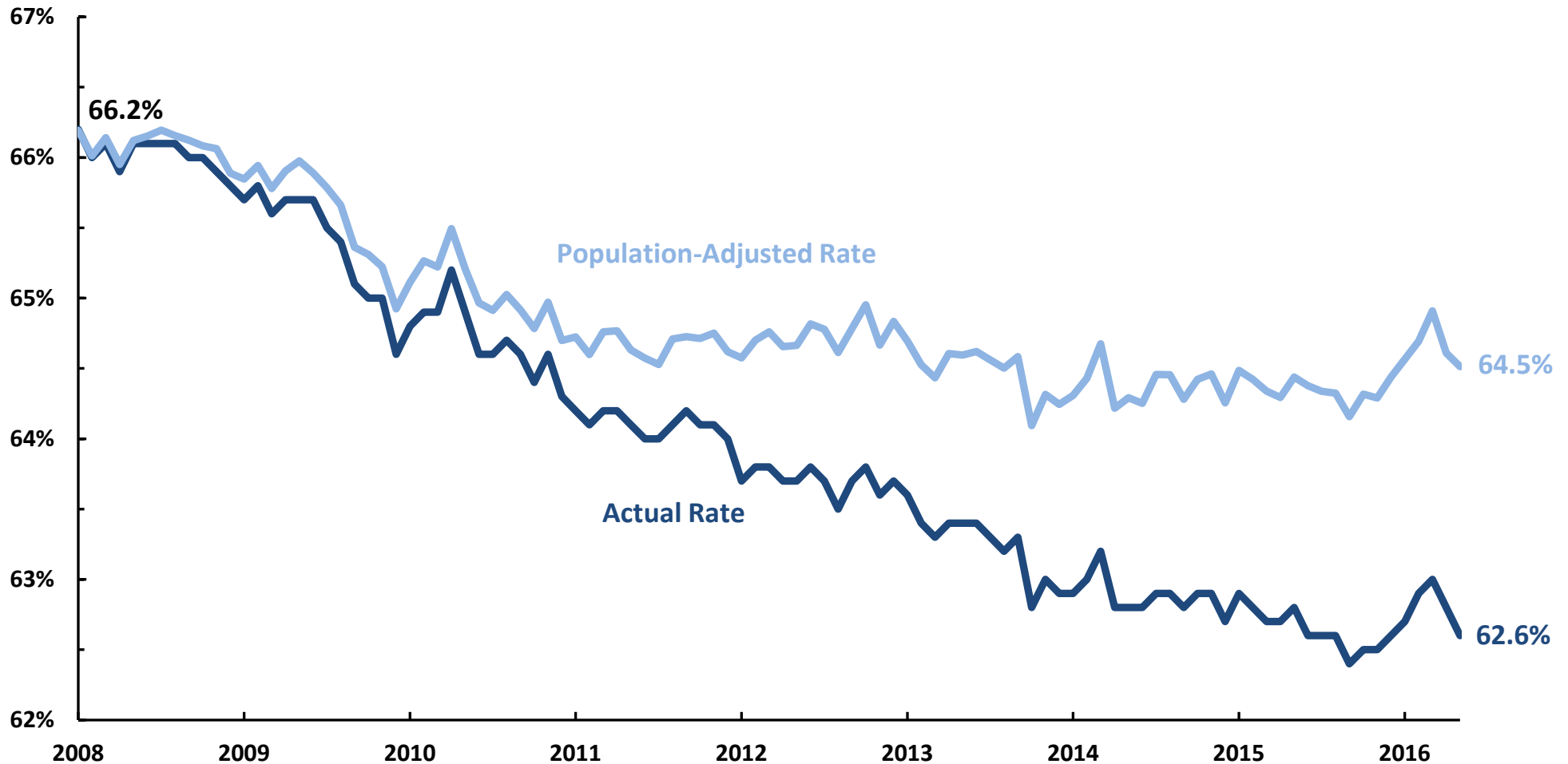
