

## Child Care in the United States Is Unaffordable

- Nearly 12 million children under age five are in some form of child care in the United States. ${ }^{1}$
- More than four out of five (83 percent) parents of young children report that finding quality, affordable child care in their area was a serious problem. ${ }^{2}$
- In 31 states, a typical married couple with two children (an infant and a four-year-old) in child care spends on average more than 20 percent of their income on child care. In six states, a typical married couple with two young children in child care spends more than 25 percent of their income on child care.
- In every state, the average cost of child care for a typical family with two young children exceeds the median cost of rent. ${ }^{3}$
