

Median household income up \$2,800 in 2015, an increase of more than 5 percent



Median household income adjusted to 2015 dollars, 1975 to 2015





The number of people in poverty fell by 3.5 million from 2014 to 2015



Social Security lifted 22.1 million Americans out of poverty in 2015, including 15.1 million seniors



Percent of individuals without health insurance by age, 2013 and 2015



All Major Racial and Ethnic Groups Saw Income Gains in 2015, but Large Disparities Remain



Poverty Rates in Black and Hispanic Communities Fell in 2015, but Remain Well Above the National Average





Percentage of individuals without health insurance by race and ethnicity, 2015



Median annual earnings of women and men working full-time, year-round, 1960 to 2015





Compared to white men, Asian women earn 84¢ on the dollar; white women earn 75¢ on the dollar; black women earn 63¢ on the dollar; and Latinas earn 54¢ on the dollar
