



Net change in employment, January 2010 to December 2016



Percent of the labor force unemployed by duration, January 2000 to December 2016



January 2000 to December 2016



January 2000 to December 2016



Veterans' Unemployment Rates


12-month moving averages, January 2010 to December 2016
