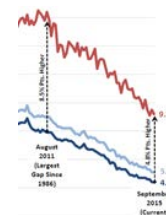

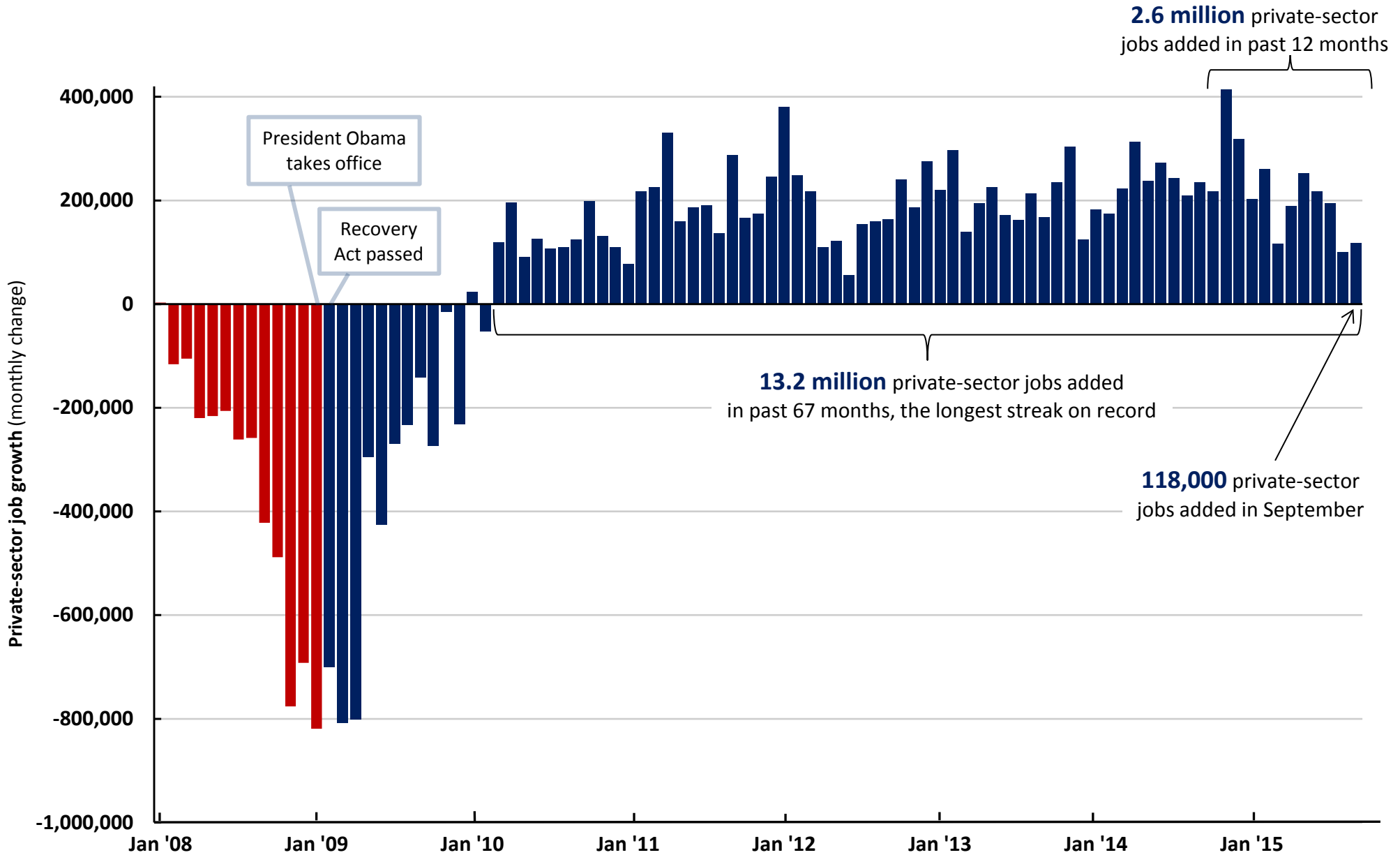

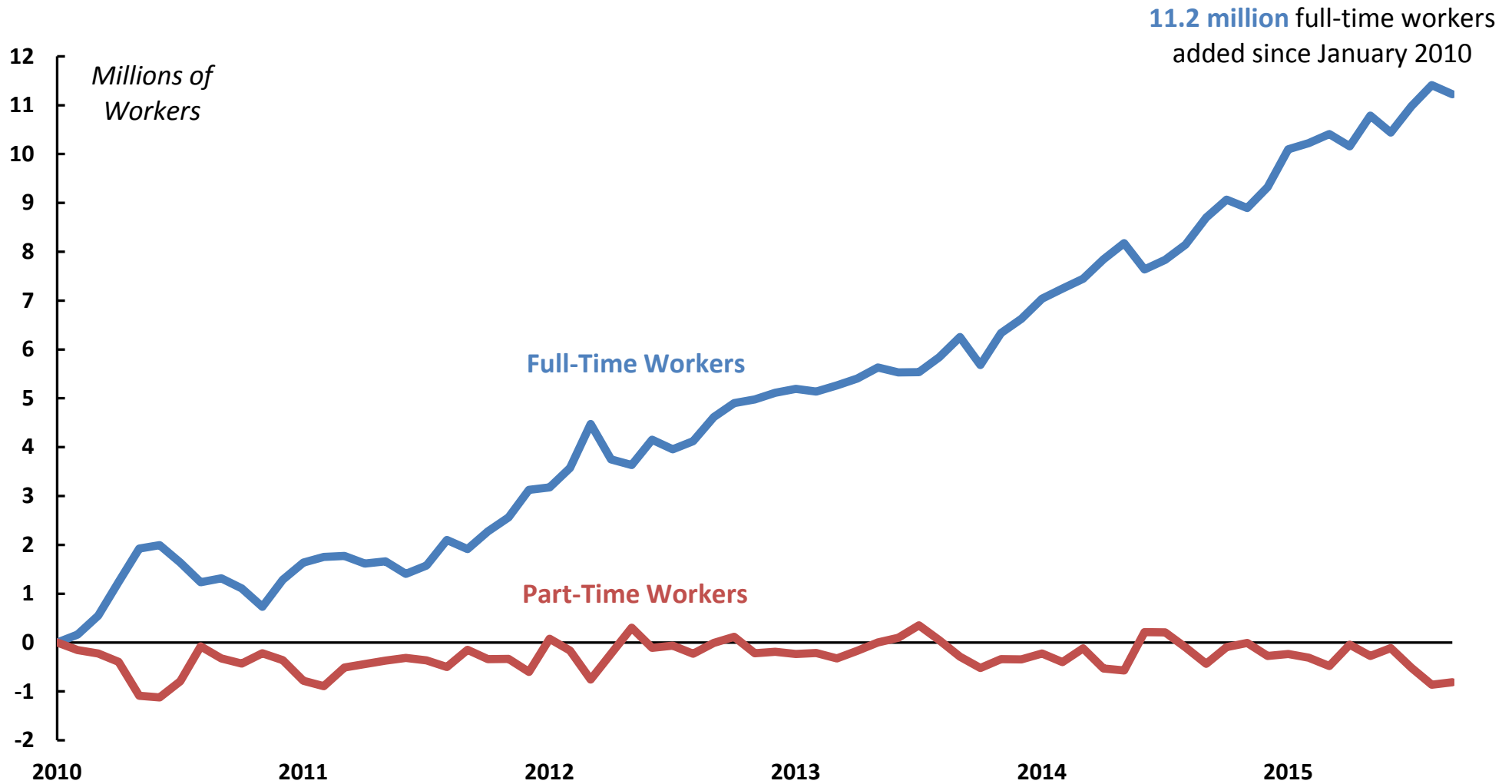
Private-Sector Job Growth Continues in September

All Employment Growth Has Been Full-Time Jobs

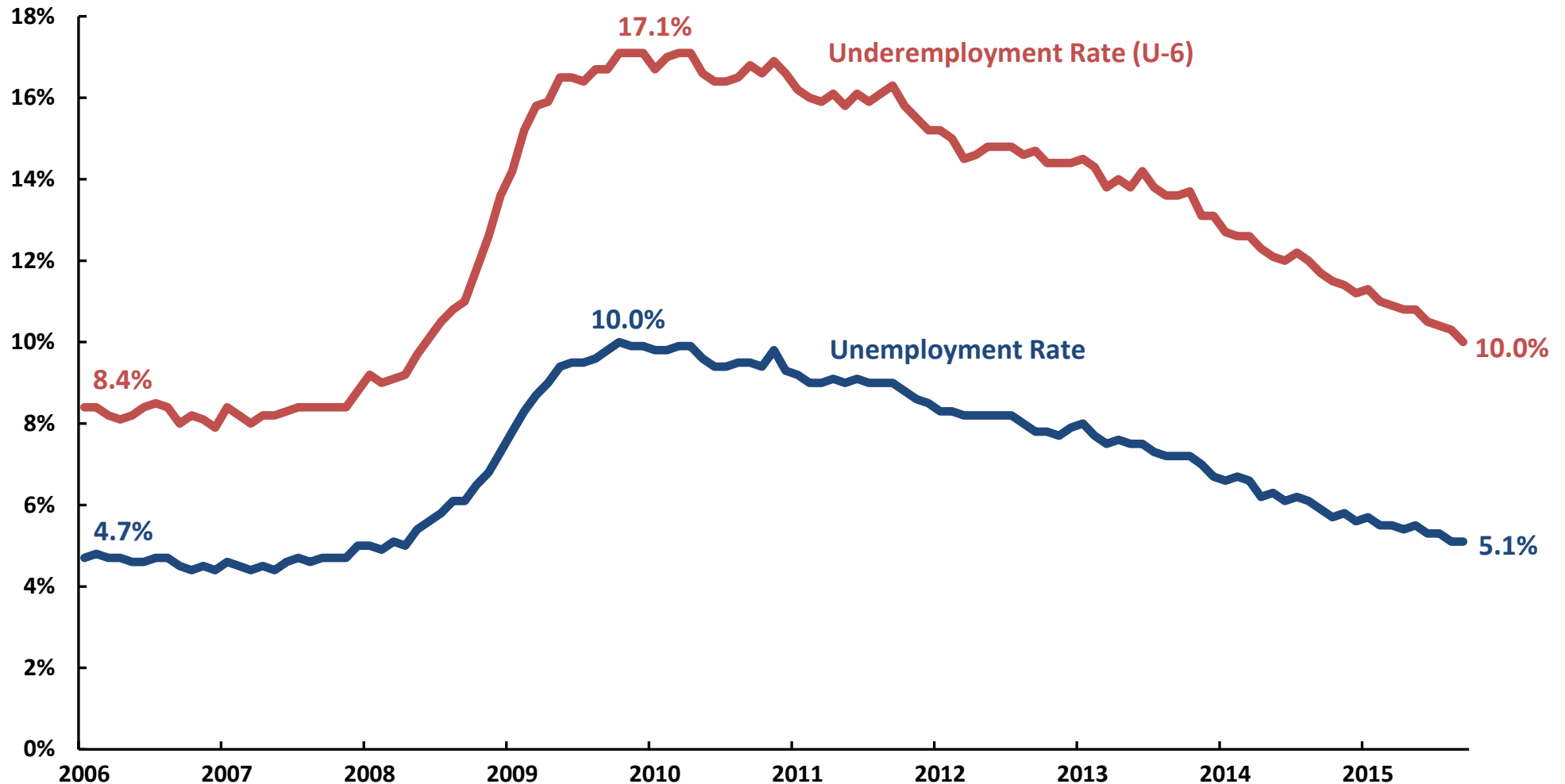
Net change in employment, January 2010 to September 2015

Declines in Short- and Long-Term Unemployment

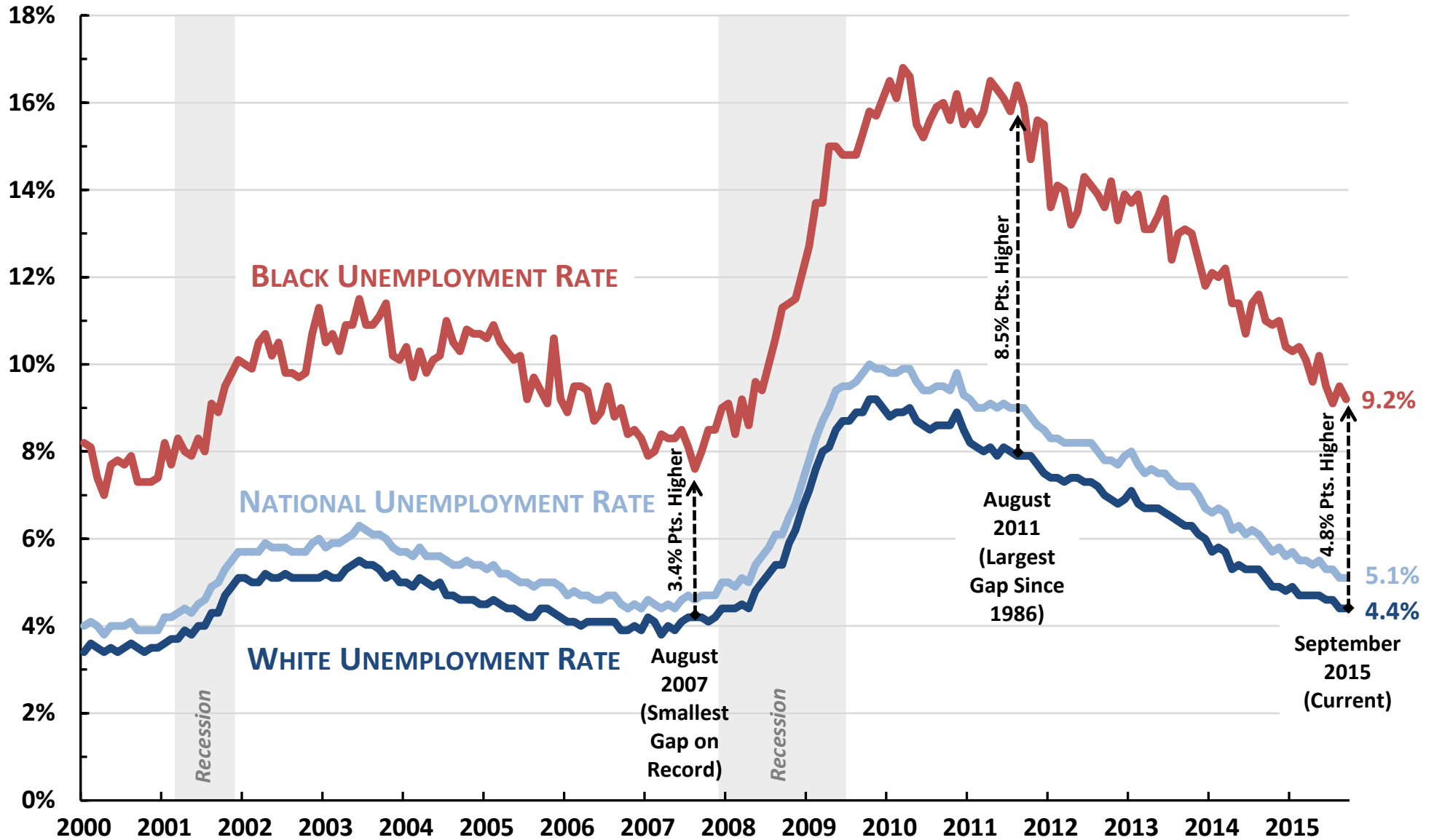
Percent of the labor force unemployed by duration, January 2000 to September 2015

Black vs. White Unemployment

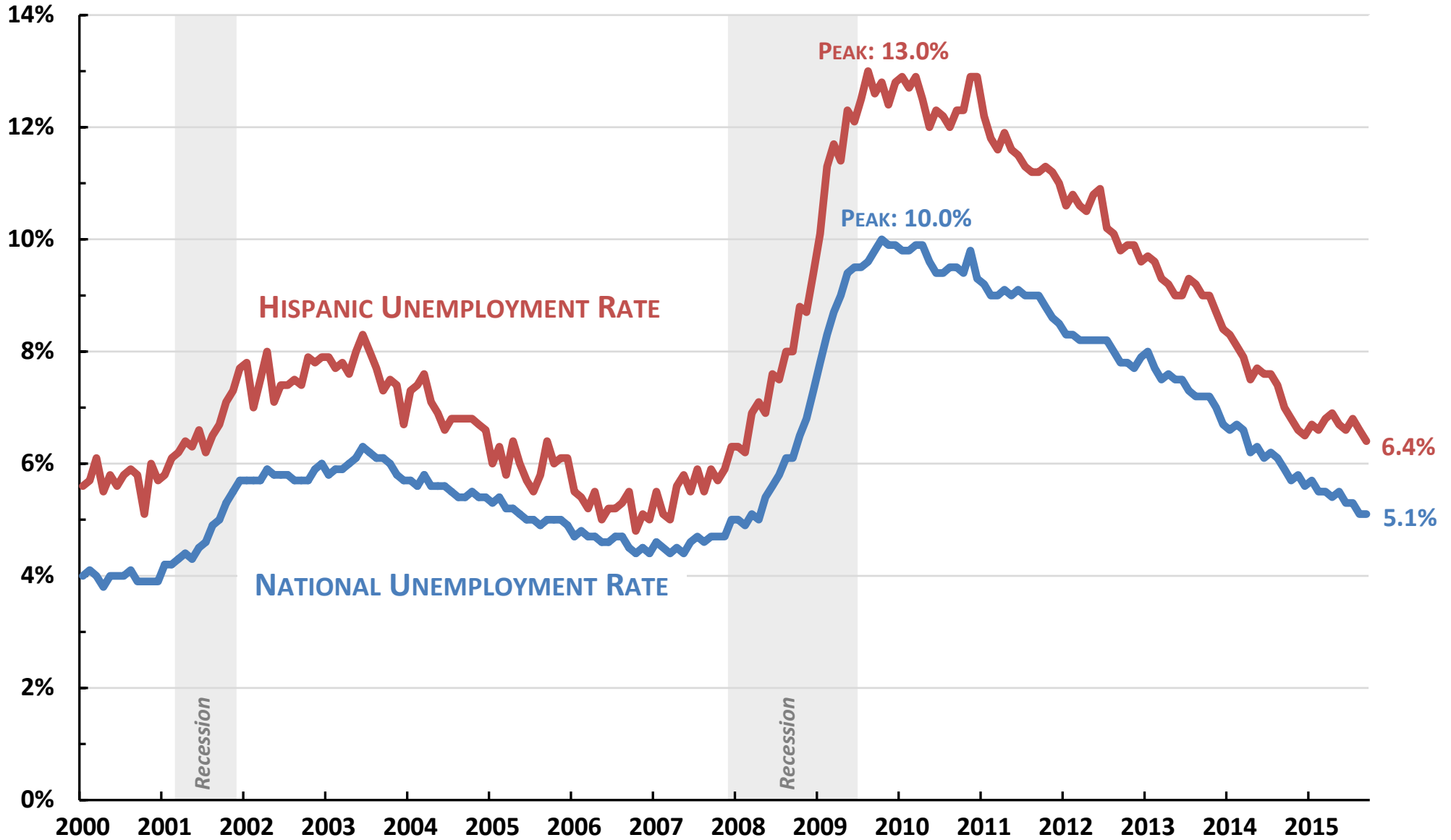

January 2000 to September 2015

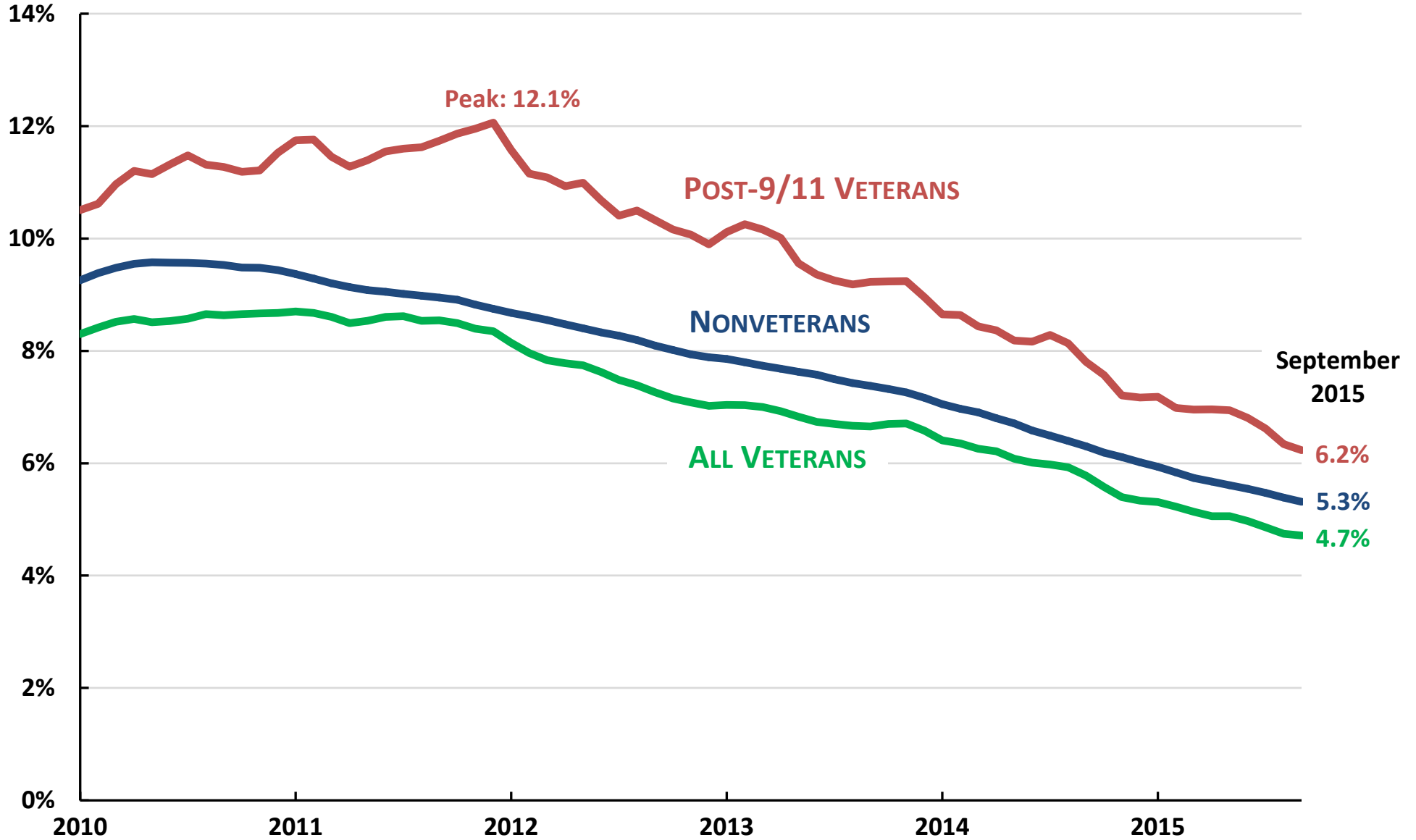

Veterans' Unemployment Rates

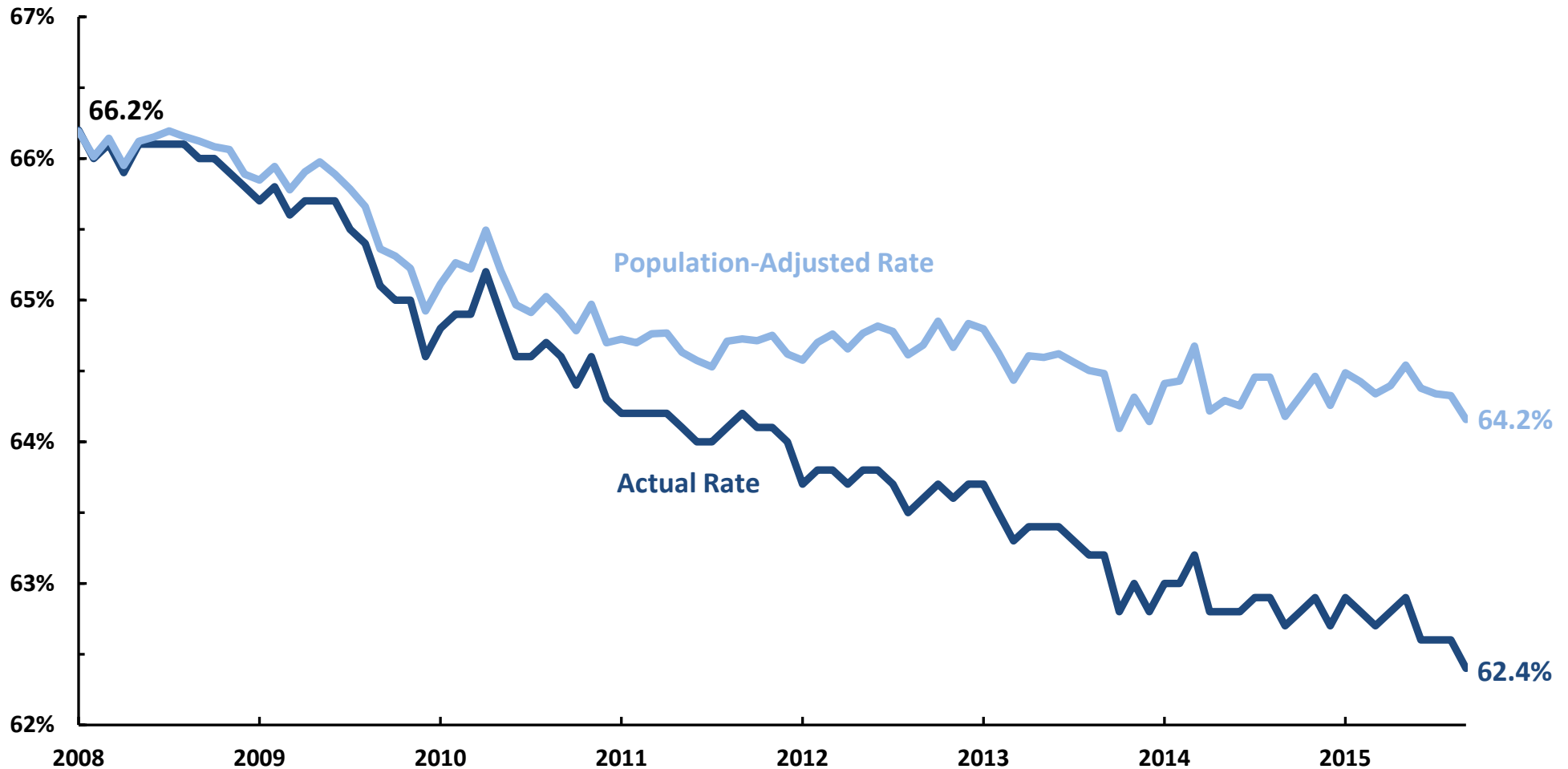
12-month moving averages, January 2010 to September 2015
