

Puerto Rico Employment Situation Summary

National Employment Data

- The U.S. economy added 336,000 jobs in September, and the United States has seen 32 consecutive months of job growth under President Biden.
- Since President Biden came into office, the United States has added more than 13.9 million jobs, and at 3.8%, the unemployment rate remains near historic lows.
- In September, the unemployment rate was 5.7% for Black workers, 4.6% for Hispanic workers, 2.8% for Asian workers, 3.4% for white workers, and 6.9% (not seasonally adjusted) for American Indian and Alaska Native workers.


- Since President Biden took office, 101,800 jobs have been created in Puerto Rico.
- In the month of September, 2,000 jobs were created in Puerto Rico.

Note: Positive change reflects net job creation. "Recovered" refers to the share of jobs recovered since the pandemic low point as a share of jobs lost during the pandemic. Jobs lost during the pandemic are measured as the difference between the number of jobs in the industry in February 2020 and the number at the "low point" of the pandemic–the month with the fewest people employed in a given industry. The month of the low point varies by industry.

Puerto Rico Unemployment Rate




