# Quote of the week

## What you need to know

- The Bureau of Labor Statistics reported that <u>661K nonfarm jobs were added to the economy in</u> <u>September</u>, however there has been a net loss of almost 10.7 million jobs since February.
- <u>The unemployment rate fell to 7.9%</u> in September. The unemployment rate was 12.1% for Blacks, 10.3% for Hispanics, 8.9% for Asians and 7% for Whites.
- Data from the U.S. Department of Commerce showed that <u>personal income fell by 2.7%</u> in August, which was due in large part to the reduction in unemployment benefits.
- Almost <u>787K American workers filed new unemployment claims</u> for the week ending Sept. 26, which is more than four and a half times the number of claims filed during the comparable week in 2019. Nearly 27 million Americans currently are receiving unemployment benefits.
- Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, <u>one in four women are considering a reduction in their work</u> <u>hours</u>, switching to a less demanding job, taking a leave of absence or not working altogether.

## Chart of the week

A new report by the Federal Reserve shows that the median wealth of Black and Hispanic households grew by a large percentage over the 30 years up to 2019 – but from very low starting points.

The median wealth of White households grew three times more in real dollars (\$46,700), than that of Black households (\$16,200). The median wealth of Hispanic households gained \$25,800, about half of the median wealth gain of White households. The pandemic has further increased these wealth gaps.

#### New research and reports

- The Joint Economic Committee released <u>*The Economic State of the Hispanic Community in America*</u>, which includes examination of the impact of the coronavirus and the important role of the Hispanic community in re-building the economy after the pandemic.
- The Joint Economic Committee Democratic staff released <u>*The Economic Impact of America's*</u> <u>*Failure to Contain the Coronavirus*</u>, following a recent hearing on the same topic. The detailed fact sheet aggregates the most important information and includes extensive links to key sources.
- A report from the Brookings Institution finds that <u>access to Paycheck Protection Program (PPP)</u> <u>loans differed greatly based on neighborhood demographics.</u> It shows that small businesses in majority-White neighborhoods received PPP loan funds more quickly than small businesses in majority-Black or majority-Hispanic/Latino neighborhoods.
- The CEO Caucus Survey conducted by the Chief Executive Leadership Institute at the Yale School of Management finds that <u>55% of business leaders gave President Trump a failing grade of F</u> for his handling of the COVID-19 pandemic; 84% of those surveyed also said that the Trump administration's response to the crisis had hurt their businesses.
