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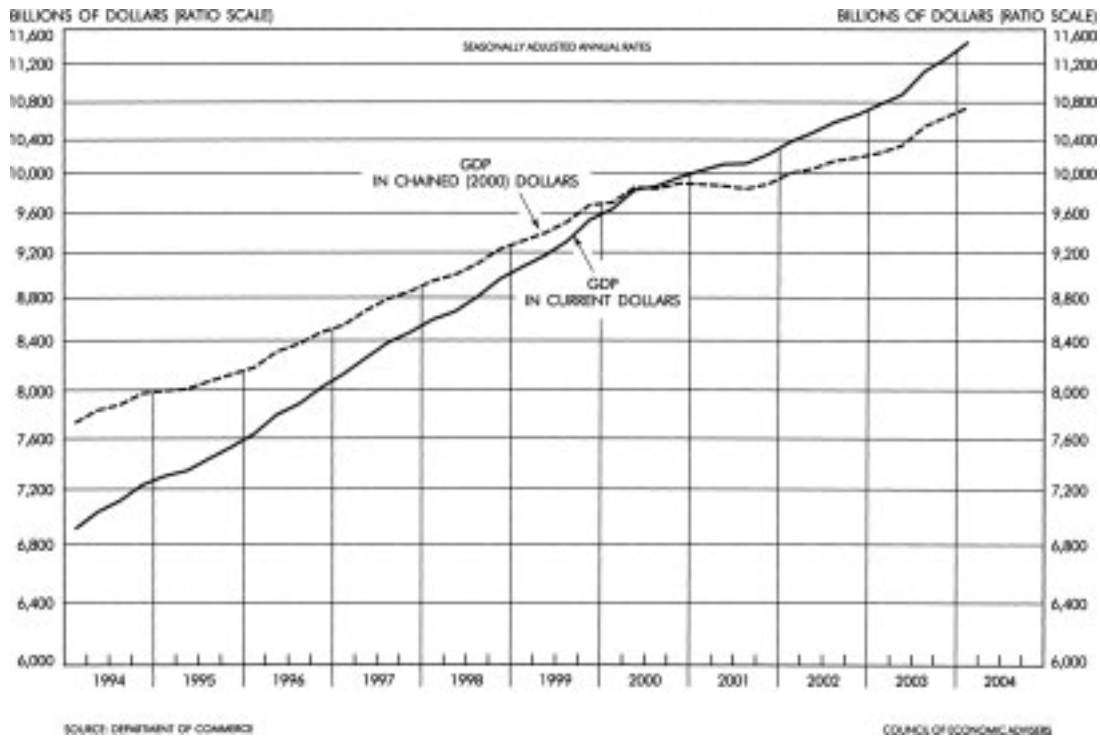
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# TOTAL OUTPUT, INCOME, AND SPENDING

## GROSS DOMESTIC PRODUCT

In the first quarter of 2004, according to revised estimates, current-dollar gross domestic product (GDP) rose 6.9 percent (annual rate), real GDP (GDP in chained 2000 dollars) rose 3.9 percent, and the implicit price deflator rose 2.9 percent.

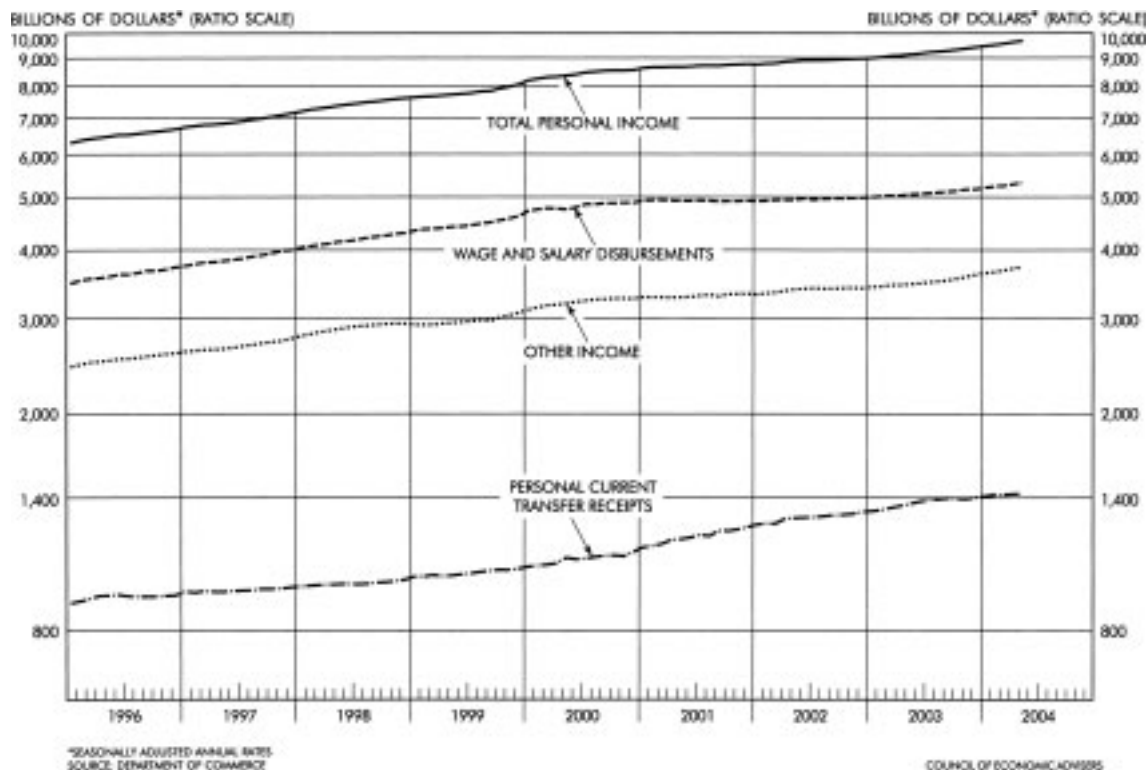

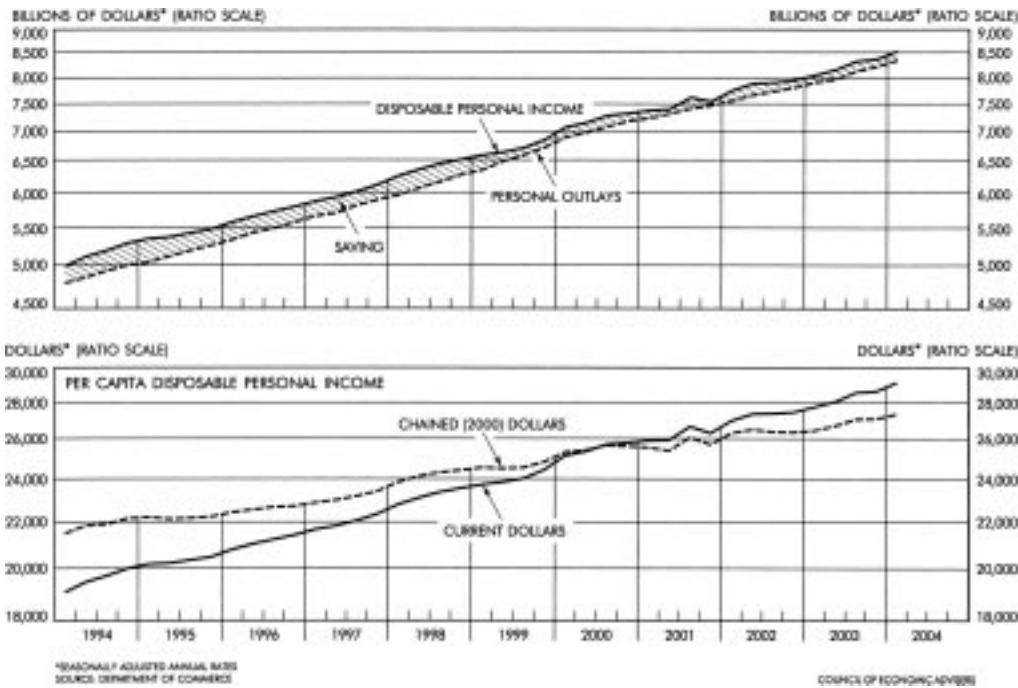

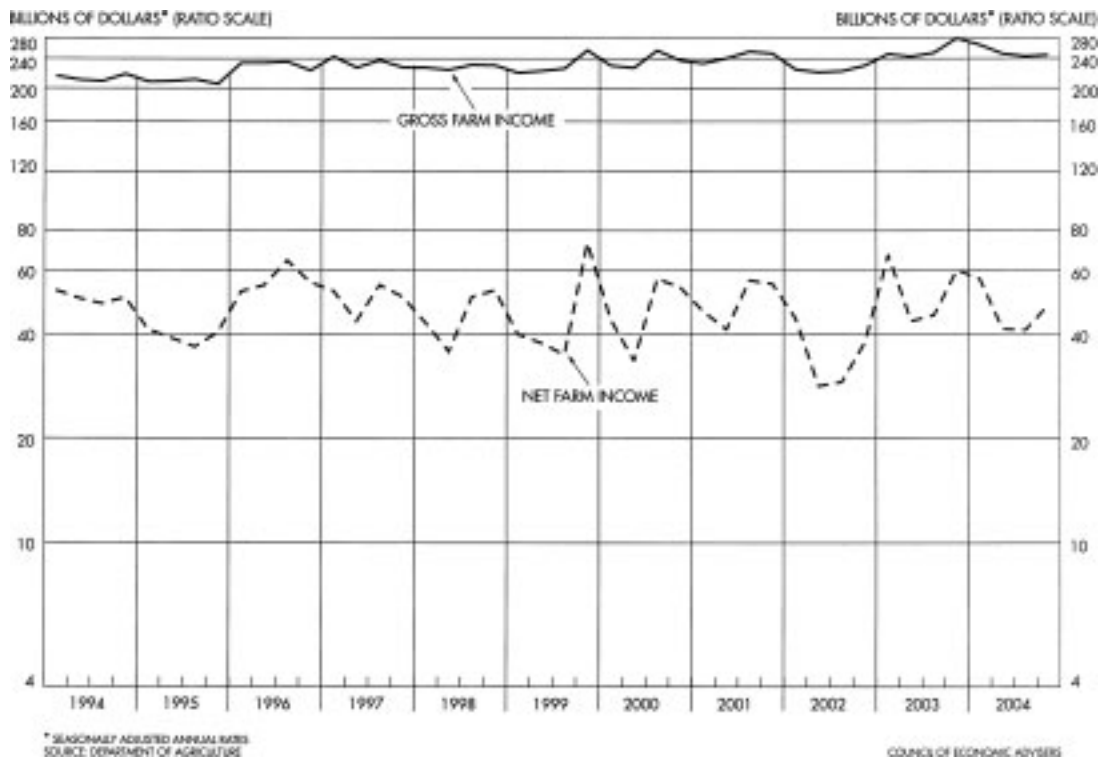

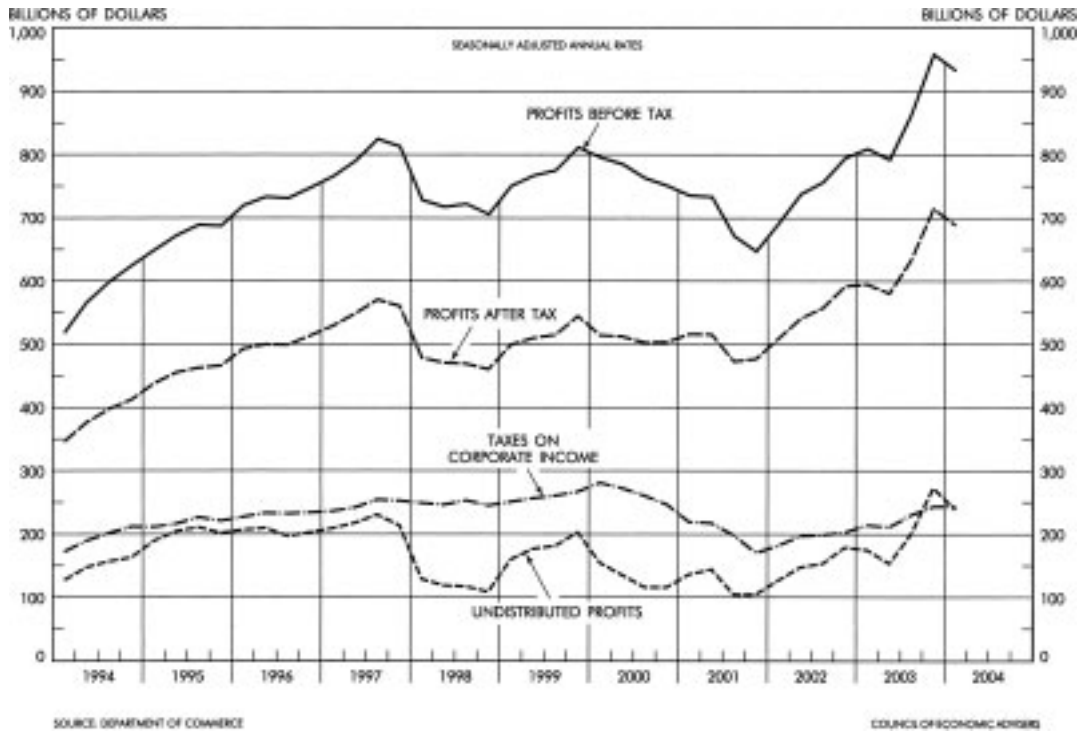

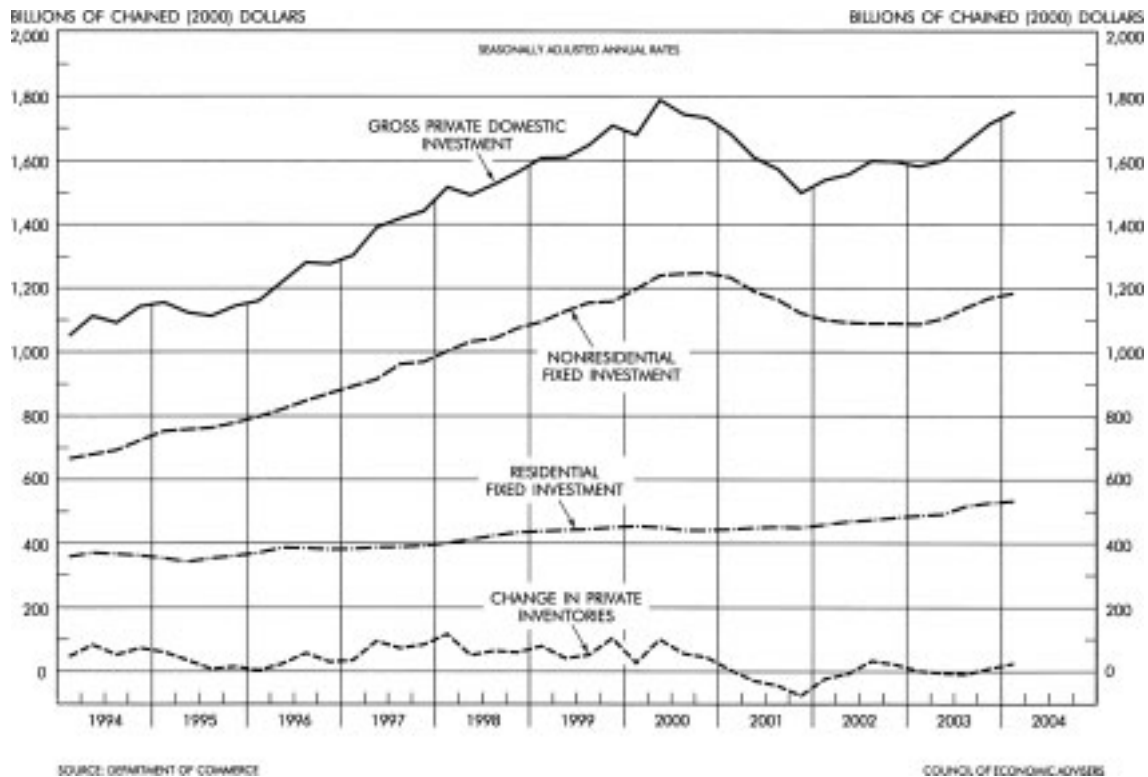

## REAL GROSS PRIVATE DOMESTIC INVESTMENT

In the first quarter of 2004, according to revised estimates, nonresidential fixed investment in chained (2000) dollars rose \$15.2 billion (annual rate) and residential investment rose \$5.9 billion. There was an increase of \$25.5 billion in inventories following an increase of \$9.0 billion in the fourth quarter.

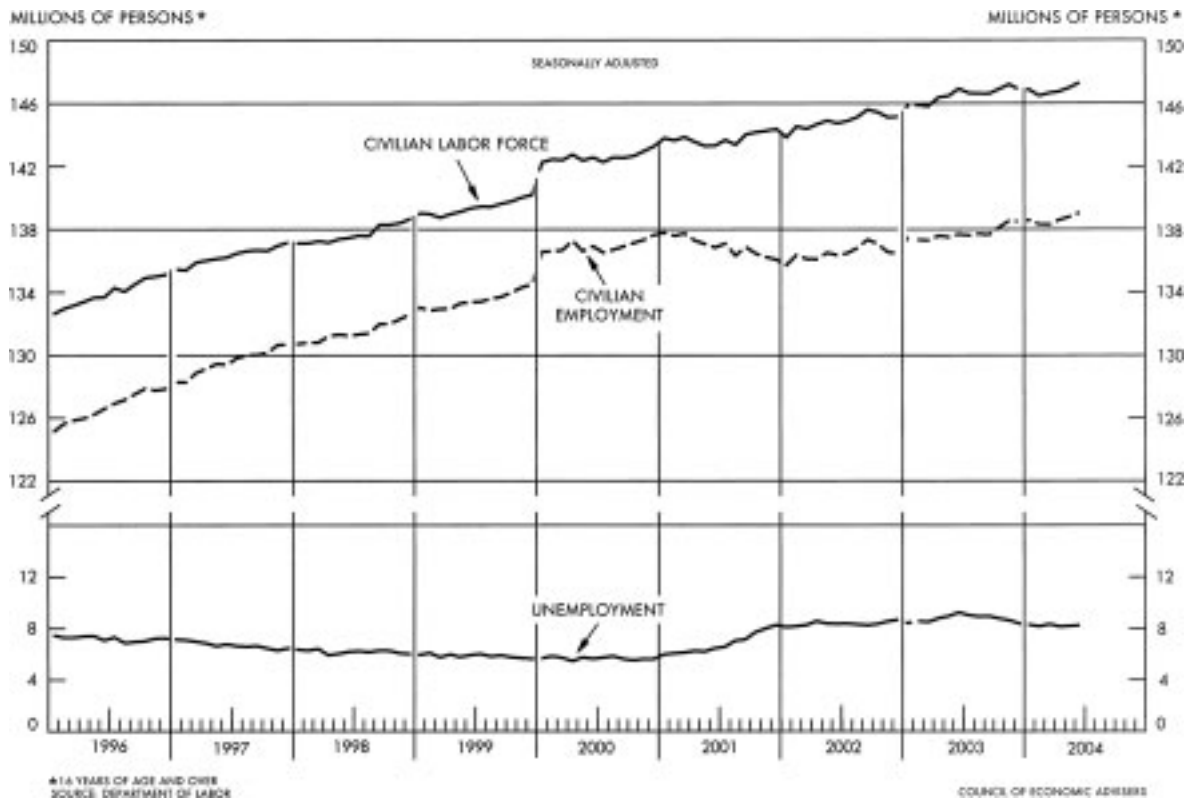

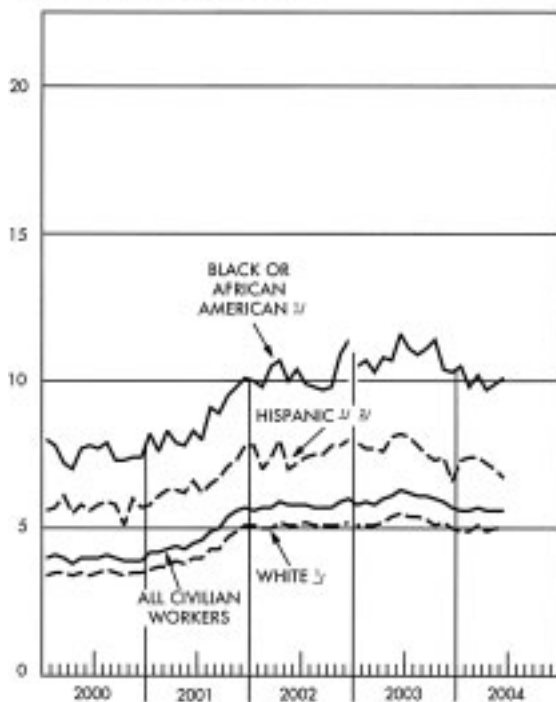

In June, the percentages of the unemployed who had been out of work for less than 5 weeks and for 27 weeks and over fell; the percentages for 5–14 weeks and for 15–26 weeks rose. The mean duration of unemployment fell to 19.9 weeks and the median duration rose to 10.8 weeks.

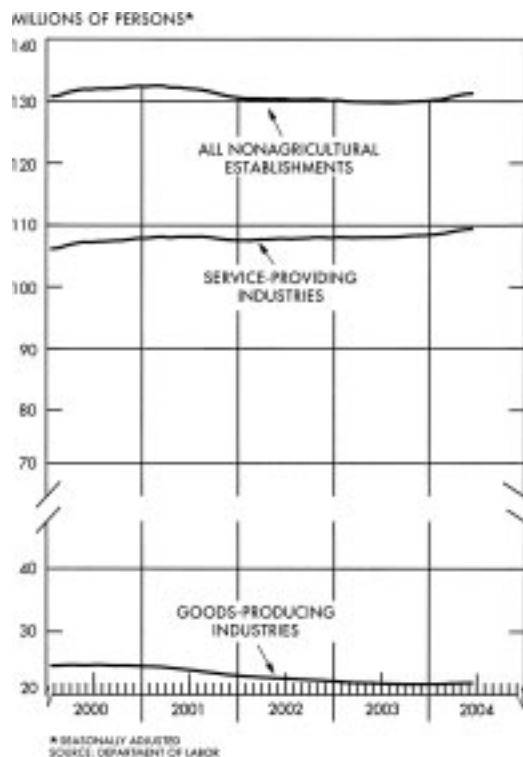

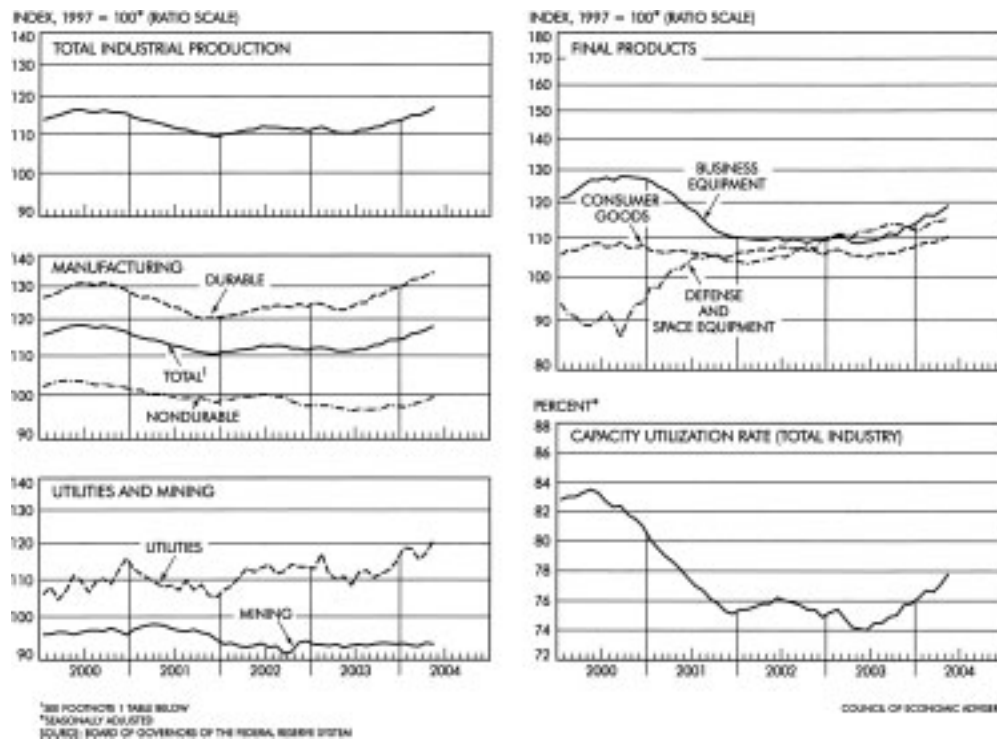

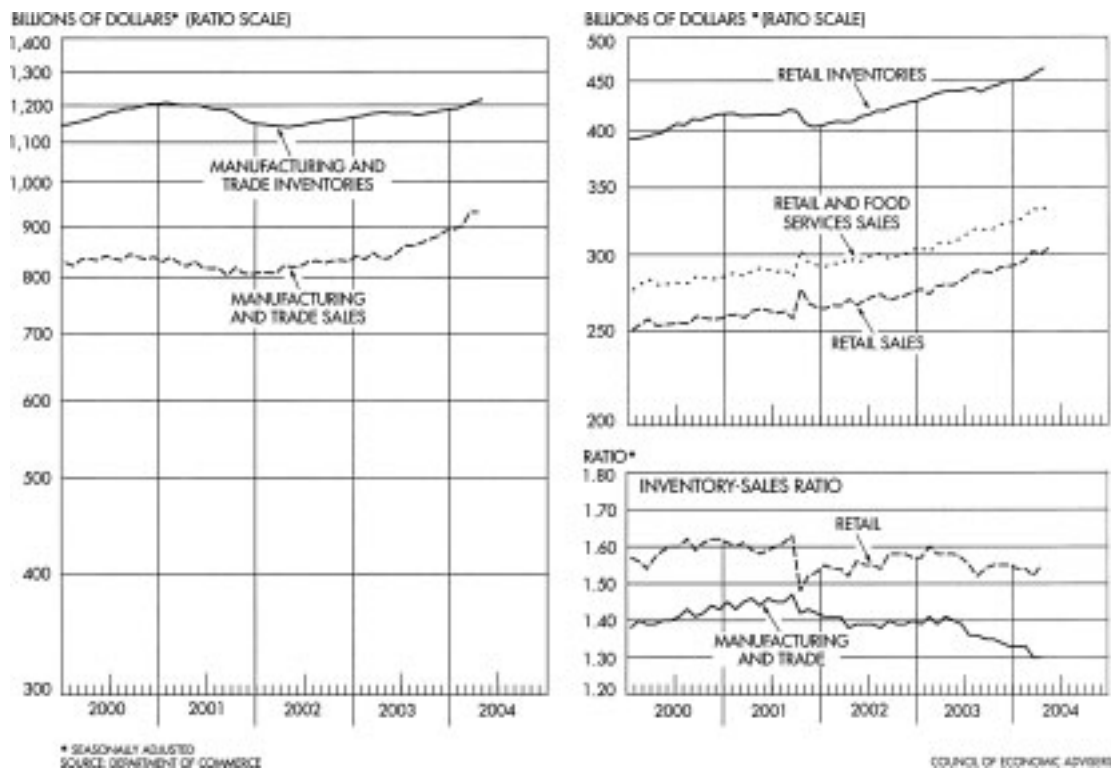

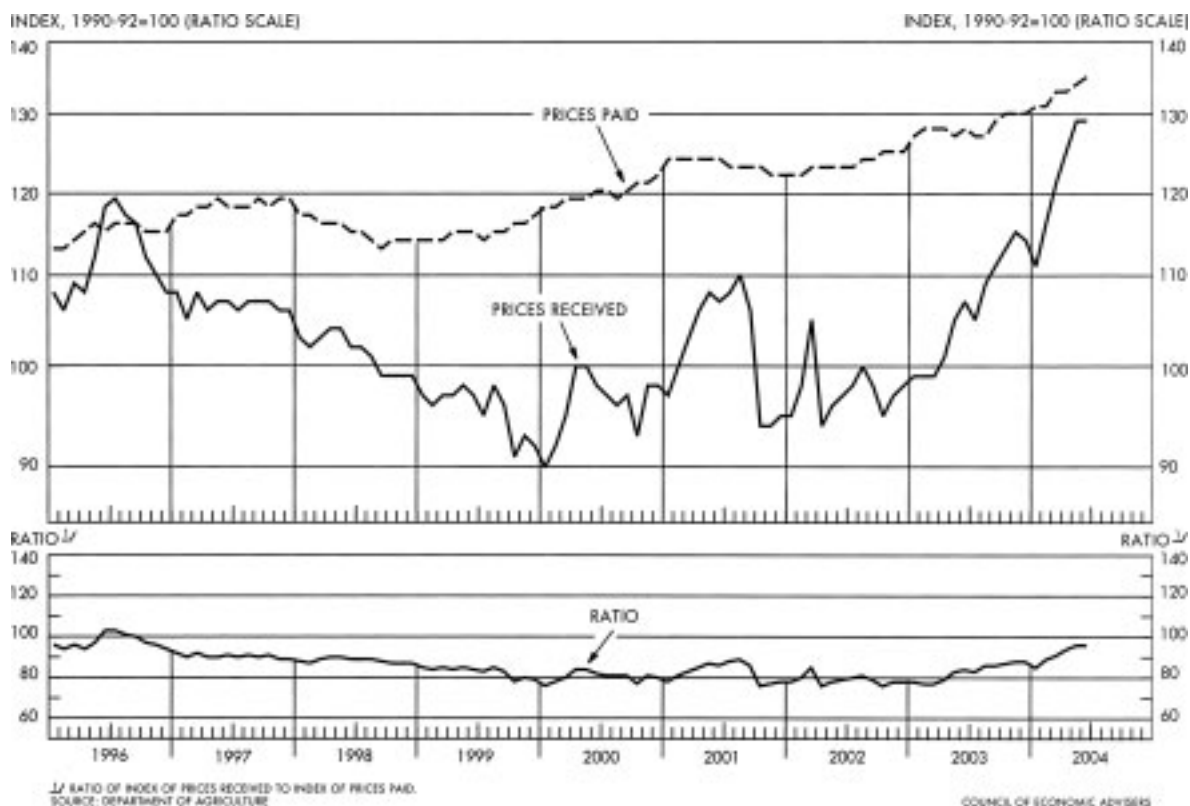

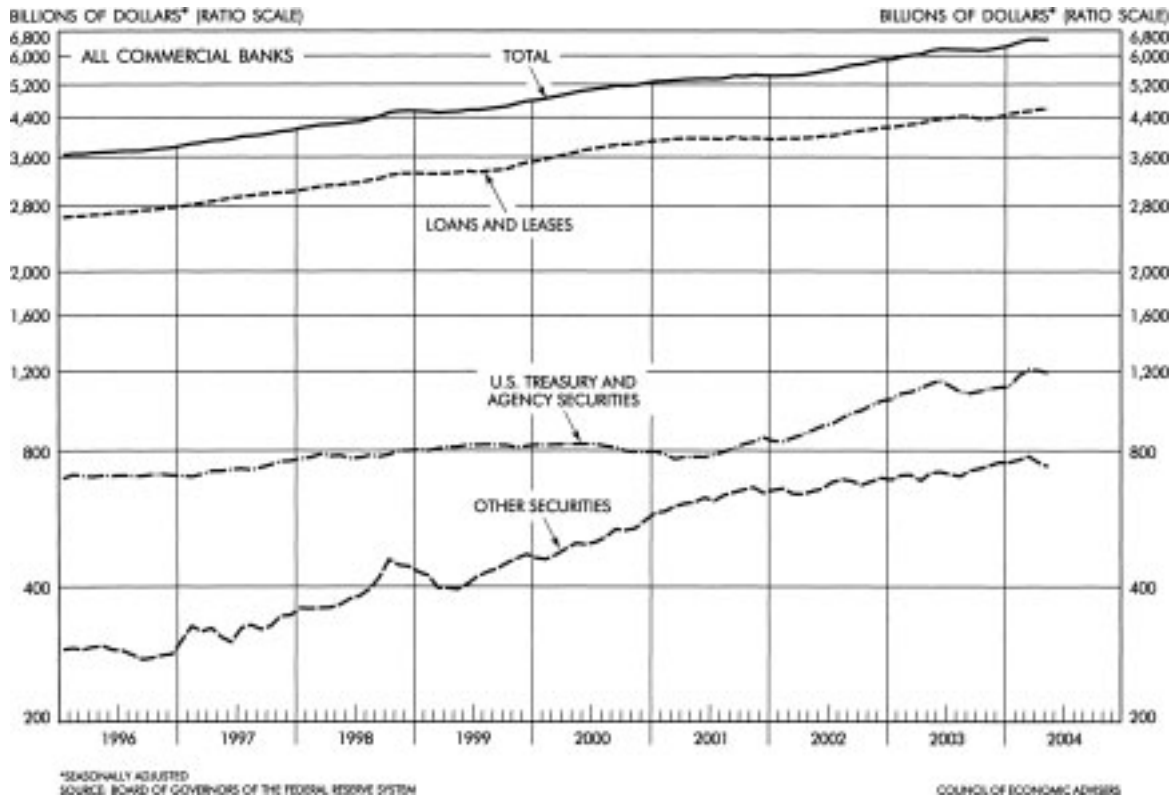

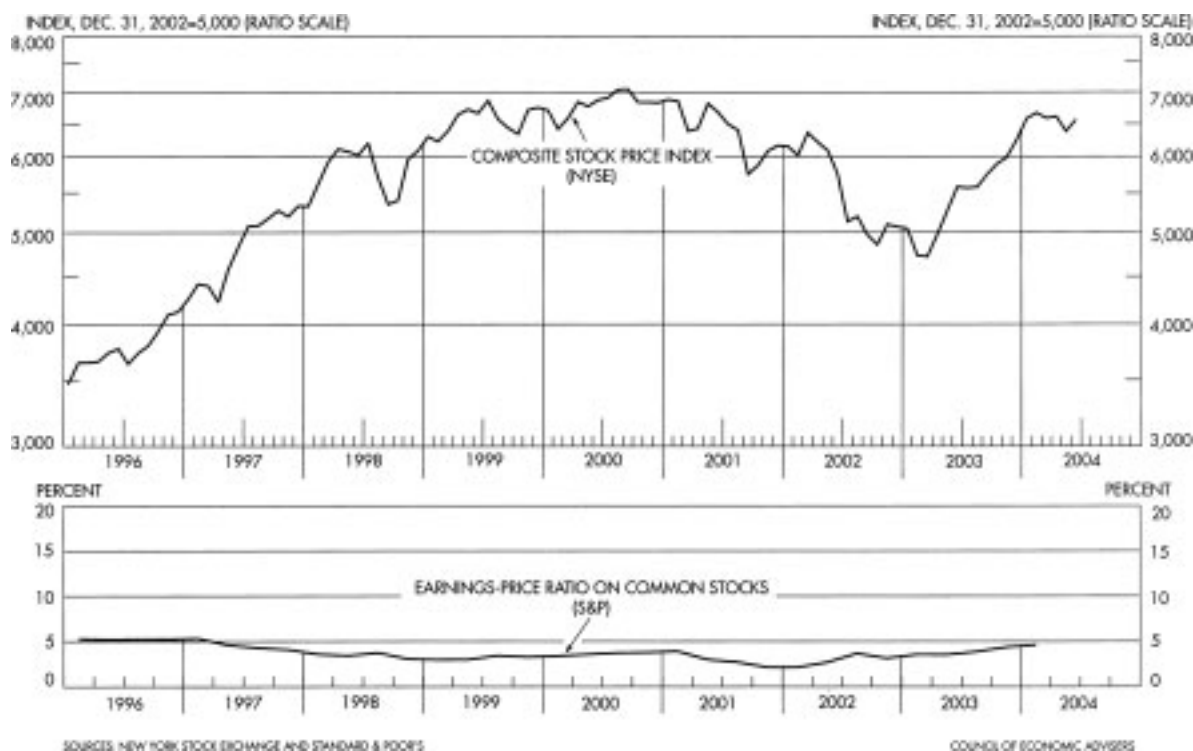

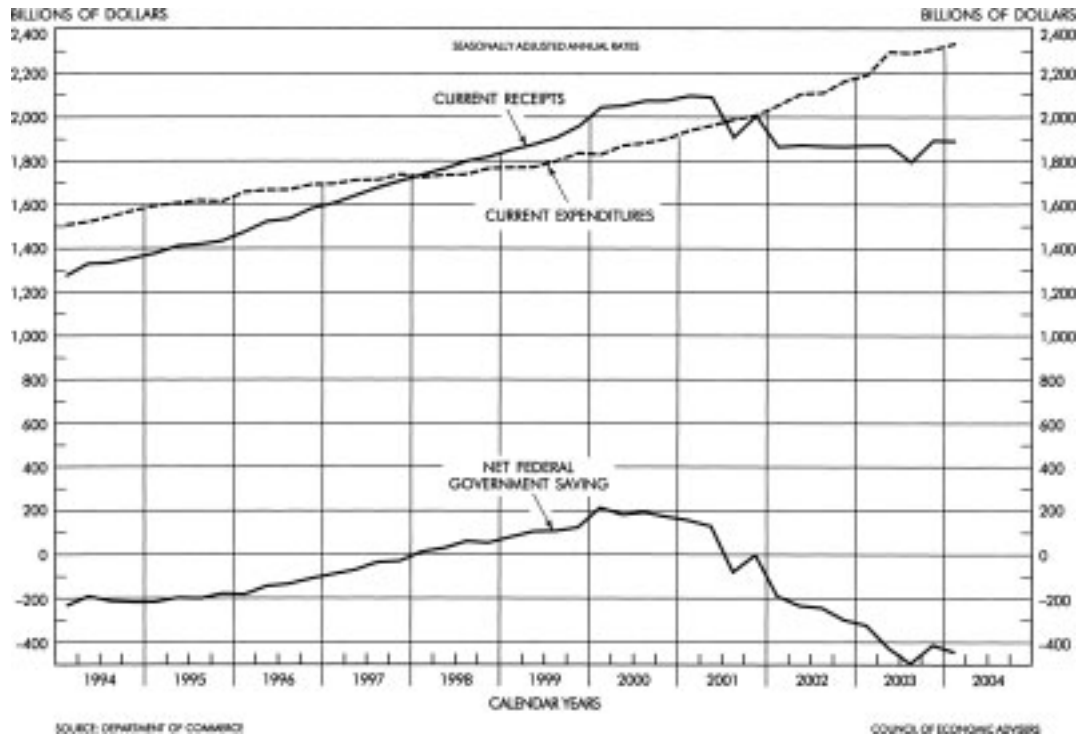

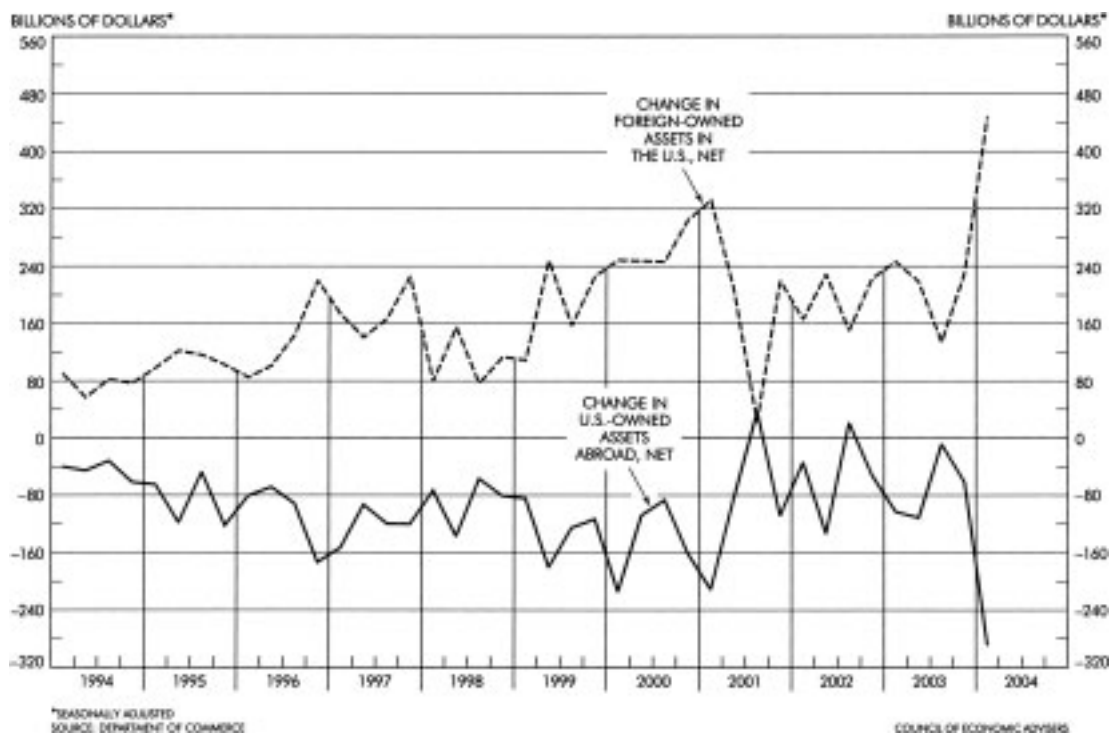

In the financial account, U.S. claims on foreigners reported by U.S. banks increased \$183.4 billion in the first quarter of 2004, in contrast to a decrease of \$47.1 billion in the fourth quarter of 2003. U.S. liabilities to private foreigners reported by U.S. banks, excluding Treasury securities, increased \$141.3 billion in the first quarter, following an increase of \$35.8 billion in the fourth quarter.
