### Georgia Employment Situation Summary

#### **National Employment Data**

- Since President Biden took office, 4,817,000 jobs have been created nationwide, an average of 602,000 created each month.
- In the month of September, the latest for which national data are available, 194,000 jobs were created, and the unemployment rate dropped to 4.8%, outperforming expectations and reaching a new pandemic-era low.
- The unemployment rate went down for adult men (4.7%), adult women (4.2%), white workers (4.2%) and Black workers (7.9%). The unemployment rate among Asian workers (4.2%) and Hispanic workers (6.3%) remained stable.

#### **State Employment Data**

- Since President Biden took office, 127,000 jobs have been created in Georgia.
- In the month of September, the latest for which state-level data are available, 14,300 jobs were created in Georgia.




# **Georgia Unemployment Rate**
